#### **Survey Specifications**




- The International Republican Institute (IRI) conducted a national survey of adult Tunisians (18+ years) from July 26-August 8, 2012.
- Data was collected in the field by a Tunisian owned and operated marketing research firm, ELKA Consulting, under the supervision of David Williams from Williams and Associates of Salem, Massachusetts.
- Interviewing was collected using the in-person, face-to-face methodology by trained professional interviewers using a multi-stage stratification proportionate to population sample distribution.
- The Kish method was used to select respondents 18 years and older within the randomly selected household. The left hand method was used to select every third household in localities selected through an area probability sample.
- Stratification was based on three stages: a proportional division among Tunisia's 24 governorates, proportional division of urban and rural categories, and proportional division by gender and age group according to the most up-to-date data from Tunisia's National Statistics Institute collected in July 2009. The sample was then post-weighted to make it proportionate to national representation by province.
- Each of Tunisia's 24 governorates was divided into territorial sections or districts. In every territorial section at least one point of survey was selected with the overall number of points determined by population density. In every point of survey, interviewers were called to do no more than 10 interviews. Points of survey were distributed proportionally between rural and urban areas in every governorate and in every geographical section of the governorate. Points of survey in a territorial section within a governorate were selected randomly.
- A total of 1,265 interviews were completed yielding an overall margin of error of  $\pm$  2.81 percent at the midrange of the 95 percent confidence level.
- The male-to-female ratio of respondents was 51 percent male to 49 percent female.
- The urban-to-rural ratio of respondents was 64 percent urban to 36 percent rural.
- The geographic and demographic distributions conform to the most recent generally accepted official statistics available.
- Stratification is based on population distribution according to the latest census.
- The information in this report has been compiled in accordance with international standards for market and social research methodologies.
- Figures in charts and tables may not sum to 100 percent due to rounding.








#### How would you describe the current economic situation in Tunisia?









#### Has your household's financial situation gotten better or worse over the last year?






Thinking ahead to next year, do you expect your household's financial situation to be better or worse?





#### Which answer best describes your current economic situation?








#### On a scale from one to seven, where one is outstanding and seven is terrible, how satisfied are you with the quality of your life?














#### What kind of job are you looking for? (spontaneous response, top responses only; n=414)








### Have you ever worked, or have you ever considered, working as a self-employed person?








# If you were once self-employed, why did you stop working as a self-employed person? (spontaneous response, top responses only; n=104)








#### What prevented you from working as a self-employed person? (spontaneous response, top responses only; n=431)








### If you are seeking a job, do you expect help from the government in finding a job? (n=435)








### What kind of help should the government provide? (spontaneous response, top responses only; n=292)








#### What do you think is the best way to increase jobs in Tunisia?








### What do you believe is the primary role of the National Constituent Assembly?








#### How long do you believe the National Constituent Assembly should take to complete its mandate?








#### In your opinion how closely associated is each of the following with a strong economy?








### How often do you keep informed about the National Constituent Assembly's work?










#### Regarding the constitution, how important is it to you that the constitution be completed?










### Could you please explain why completing the new constitution is important to you? (spontaneous response, top responses only)








#### Should the new constitution be approved by a national referendum, or by a vote within the National Constituent Assembly?







### What would you say are the most important problems facing Tunisia as a whole? (spontaneous response, top responses only)












### How likely is the current government to address these issues facing Tunisia?










#### For whom did you vote in the National Constituent Assembly elections?








#### Looking back now, would you change how you voted in the National Constituent Assembly elections? (n=908)










#### Why do you believe you made the wrong choice? (n=232)








### Looking ahead to the next elections, do you intend to vote for the same party, or a different party? (n=901)








#### If you had to choose from the following political parties, for whom would you vote in the next election?










#### When do you believe Tunisia's next elections will occur?








#### In your opinion, what kind of elections will these be?








#### If you could pick, which type of government would you prefer in Tunisia?





### Do you have access to the Internet? If yes, where do you usually access it?








#### Do you know what the difference is between a secular and a nonsecular government?










#### Would you prefer to see more political parties or entities that are Islamist or secular in the National Constituent Assembly?








#### In your opinion, has security in Tunisia improved since the elections? What about the security of your neighborhood or community?
