
#### Detailed Methodology

- The International Republican Institute (IRI) carried out a survey of Ugandan citizens aged 18 years and older.
- The questionnaire was designed by Professor Robert Mattes of the <u>University of Cape Town</u>, in consultation with IRI, Uganda's political parties and civil society stakeholders. Sample design, interview training and fieldwork was carried out by <u>Hatchile Consult</u>, a social research firm, in consultation with IRI and Professor Mattes.
- Face-to-face interviews were carried out with 2,402 respondents between December 4-23, 2014.
- The margin of error for the entire study is plus or minus two percentage points.
- In Stage 1, IRI stratified all Enumerator Areas (EU) from the most recent Uganda census by sub-region and rural-urban status. IRI then randomly selected 300 EUs with the probability proportionate to the population size of each stratum.
- In Stage 2, interviewers followed random walk patterns within the selected EU to identify eight households. Within each household (Stage 3), all members of the household aged 18 years and older were listed and one was randomly selected to participate in the survey. Interviews at each household alternated between men and women. One respondent from each household was selected by creating a numbered list of adults in that household and a number was randomly drawn.
- All interviewers were conducted in the language of the respondent's choice.
- In total 3,039 houses were visited to obtain 2,402 interviews. Thus, the response rate for this survey was 79 percent.
- The survey was funded by the <u>United States Agency for International Development</u>.




### Since the last national election in 2011, would you say that each of the following have gotten better, stayed the same or become worse?




### Looking *ahead*, do you expect the following to be better or worse in 12 months time?




What about the overall direction of the country? Do you feel Uganda is going in the right direction or going in the wrong direction?






















Thinking of the most important problem you just identified, how well or badly would you say government has handled that issue since the 2011 elections?








I vote on the basis of the individual merits of a man or woman. The party they belong to is of secondary interest. I vote for a candidate who belongs to the political party that advances ideas I support.

The country's opposition parties are personal platforms for disgruntled politicians who have left the NRM. The country's opposition parties represent real causes and interests.





On the whole, how would you rate the freeness and fairness of the last national elections, held in 2011?






## Thinking about politics today in Uganda, how often do people have to be careful of what they say about politics?
























Do you think that the Free and Fair Elections Campaign represents the interests of government, of opposition parties, or of ordinary citizens, or haven't you heard enough about it to say?















Members of Parliament have different responsibilities. Which of the following do you think is the most important responsibility of your Member of Parliament?




Elected local government councilors have different responsibilities. Which of the following do you think is the most important responsibility of your elected local government councilor?






Do you agree or disagree with the following statement?: Women are equally represented in the political decision-making positions in Uganda.



## How likely, if at all, are you to vote in the next elections for a woman candidate?




# How likely, if at all, are you to vote in the next elections for a candidate younger than 30?


